Cama Beach and Me

Jim Larson called me to ask if I could contribute an article about Cama Beach State Park, which was inaugurated on the Summer Solstice, June 21st this year. So I guess I'll spin you a yarn about Cama Beach, with perhaps some Masonry thrown in for good measure.

Cama Beach was originally the brainchild of Dick Wagner, the Founder of the *Center for Wooden Boats* on Lake Union in Seattle. I've known Dick since the '60's and he is a man of remarkable vision and energy. He was trained as an architect back East and came to Seattle, where he fell in love with his life's companion, Colleen, and with the maritime scene here. Over the years he began collecting old historic boats and restoring them, to use them to teach people to sail and row, and to acquaint them with their maritime heritage. He lives in a houseboat beneath the Aurora Bridge, and for many years he moored his stable of boats behind the houseboat and held meetings in his living room. People could use the boats and he would teach them the to

rudiments of rowing and sailing. He acquired a library of both maritime history and maritime skills, all of which were taught and practiced in his living room.

As interest began to grow (much larger than the living room) they acquired the old Leschi Boathouse and were renovating it to become a sort of maritime college and a place to moor his growing collection. Unfortunately, this historic building was torched by an arsonist and burned to the waterline. As the boathouse had floated on a huge raft of cedar logs, these were salvaged and sold to provide another grubstake and the Center was begun again at the toe of Lake Union on the site of an old asphalt plant.

The Center has grown over the years and Dick has been nationally recognized as a foremost developer and proponent of the concept of the living maritime museum. Colleen has also distinguished herself in promoting our Pacific Northwest maritime heritage.

During the time I first knew Dick, I was a firefighter in Sausalito California. They would come down to visit Colleen's relatives at Christmas, and I would take Dick on tours of the many interesting traditional boats that were harbored in the various marinas of Sausalito. In 1984, I was raised at Mill Valley Lodge No. 356, finally

achieving a lifelong goal. As time went on, my marriage went from sour to rancid and I moved aboard my twenty-three foot yawl, *La Mouette*. As I had little room for anything, let alone a suit, I dropped out of active participation in Lodge, though I kept in touch with many of my brethren.

In 1991, I retired as Senior Battalion Chief of the Sausalito Fire Department and could concentrate on my first love, sailing. Meanwhile, I had met the love of my life, Adrienne, who had sailed over seventy-thousand miles, exploring much of the world. A week after I retired, I set sail on the delivery passage of an old schooner, *Lizard King*, to Singapore, but that's another story.

I always wanted to return home, to the Puget Sound area where I grew up. When I returned from the Singapore trip, my divorce was finalized and Adrienne and I married and, with her Dad, we tried to live in Sausalito. Not on a small civil pension!

I called Dick to ask if he knew of anyplace in the Pacific Northwest that needed a caretaker. He said, "Why don't you come up and be caretaker for the Center for Wooden Boats at Cama Beach?"

The Risk family had owned and operated Cama Beach, which had been a motor resort for many years,

stay, and rent small boats to fish in Saratoga Passage. Over the years, the trade diminished and the site began to run down. Apparently there were a number of big developers that wanted to buy the property, log it off and build lots of tacky tacky's on it. The daughters approached Dick and asked if he could interest the Washington State Parks in preserving and restoring the resort as an historic park.

With Dick's reputation and the track record of the Center, the State was quite interested, if the Center would be the lead partner in the project. I came up in February of '94 to take some pictures to show to Adrienne's Dad, to see if he would be willing to move up. When I got back, he watched the video tape and went to bed. By the next morning, he was packed! Adrienne and Dad had to stay in California until later in the Summer as Dad was having some medical procedures done. In March, I began shutting our belongings to Cama and repairing a pair of cabins. You cannot believe the grandeur and beauty of Cama Beach. There was one couple at the North end of the beach that were caretakers for the family. Other than that, the only company were the two does that would come down the beach with their fauns, wading in the water, the eagles that would fish the shallows opposite the cabin, the pair of Great Blue Herons that lived in the tree behind the cabin and would get their breakfast at the tide line every morning, and the extended otter family that lived at the North end of the beach and swam down to the creek just South of us.

I could take many pages, just describing the sunsets over the Olympics, the wild flowers that bloomed along the seawall, the ever changing patterns of the waters of Saratoga Passage. Oh, the clams and crabs that were my staple fare!

I spent much of my days covering the cabin roofs with tarps to prevent further water damage, and working under Asko's (Karen Hamalainen's

husband) direction on cabin repair. To keep me company, I got a cat at NOAH's. Bless her heart, she is sixteen years old, now, and still going strong. Again, I could write a short book of cat tales, just about Tanya and her adventures with the wildlife at Cama.

We all expected the paperwork to be signed and the deal closed any day. The months passed. Dad and Adrienne arrived on August first and they loved it, too. The work progressed slowly, a couple of youth programs were carried through and great fun was had by all. It seemed to augur well for the Center and its youth programs. Any day now, we thought, the papers would be signed and the work could begin in earnest.

By October, with no progress, Dad said, "Let's buy a home of our own." So we did, and moved off Cama. We stayed active for several years, but still, the papers were in limbo. Work was being done to renovate the cabins and bring the property up to park standards.

Finally, after fourteen years, in March of 2008, the papers were signed! The park was finally officially opened on the Summer Solstice, June 21, 2008. Even though the solitude we enjoyed is long gone, the park is a beautiful place to visit and the cabins may be rented. The Center will be beginning its programs as a Northern Campus for the Center for Wooden Boats. There will be boat rentals and classes for rowing and sailing, boat-building classes, the whole gamut from how to loft a set of lines, and how to cast bronze rowlocks, to how to sew a sail and learn to knot and splice, will be available as they begin to gather headway.

Now, the Freemasonry part of this saga. I had been so far away from Masonry that only my dues kept me in. One day, Adrienne and I were having breakfast at the Duck Inn in Stanwood and I happened to notice the ring on a man's finger a few seats away. "I see you are a traveling man," I said.

That started a conversation, for the brother at the counter was VWB Wayne Havens! He suggested that I attend Camanio 19 in Stanwood. After thinking it over for a while, I did. The rest, as they say, is history. I have become quite active in the Craft and am now a Past Master of Camanio, Junior Warden at Garfield 41 in La Conner, am a member of several other Lodges, including Walter F. Meier Lodge of Research No. 281. I am a 32nd degree Scottish Rite Mason and a Companion of the Royal Arch.

So, for us, Cama Beach was the gateway to a new life in retirement, with a wealth of memories to keep us warm in Winter time, and has lead to hundreds of close friendships and much fellowship.

Thank you Dick, and thank you Cama Beach. Long may you flourish!

Also, as Treasurer of the Scottish Rite Scholarship Foundation of Washington, I receive a number of donations each year, and this year has brought several from around the state via United Way, which are very much appreciated. Among others, I received a generous contribution from our Bro. David McCuiston, 32°. Thanks very much, Bro. David!

Another very prominent Brother lately is our good Bro. Steve Osborne, 32°, probably our finest writer in the Valley, published a number of times in the New Age/Scottish Rite Journal and elsewhere. I believe our Ill. Bro. Carl Smith, 33°, has noted that Bro. Steve was recently elected to the national honorary Brotherhood of the Blue Forget-Me-Not! More recently I've noted that Bro. Steve was awarded the MWB George R. Bordewick Literary Achievement Award from Walter F. Meier Lodge of Research No. 281, and this was presented at Grand Lodge this year. I know Bro. Steve has also been

very active in development of the new Cama Beach State Park. Congratulations, Bro. Steve!

The Brethren may be interested in the following information piece on the Brotherhood of the Blue Forget-Me-Not, from the web:

The Masonic Brotherhood of the Blue Forget-Me-Not (MBBFMN) was founded to recognize those Freemasons who have worked primarily in the field of Masonic education. This includes writing and the many other facets that bring light to those who might otherwise be left in darkness. Those few selected are teachers who have helped members of the Craft become dedicated Master Masons. Only recipients who are deemed worthy leaders in this field by the membership commission of the Brotherhood are selected for this Award. It cannot be solicited, nor can it be purchased.

The blue forget-me-not has been chosen as a symbol of Masonic dedication, courage and fidelity. This symbol was born in the face of Nazi persecution of Freemasonry under the Hitler regime. Although the dictator ordered thousands of Freemasons murdered, tortured and incarcerated, those who would not renounce the Craft and its teachings continued to practice Freemasonry in secret. So they might know one another, a little flower was selected as their emblem. Against overwhelming odds these men, a scant handful, kept the light of Freemasonry burning throughout Nazi darkness. We are proud to perpetuate a remembrance of this unselfish dedication.

This is not a degree; it is not a political award; there will never be a plea for a greater membership. There are no dues and fees to be paid by anyone. It is in

every sense an award for service to Freemasonry and thus to our fellow man. Because of its non-political objective, and because its only members are workers in and for the Craft, many consider it the greatest honor one can receive in Freemasonry.

NATIONAL ELECTION AND SCOTTISH RITE

Apparently, there are some partisans that believe the only way to win the 2008 elections are to attempt to instill fear in the American electorate, as they are apparently devoid of legitimate issues and positions to support their candidates. We deserve better than this, which cannot be confused with civil discourse.

I believe that every Brother has a right to his political views and opinions, and we all have an obligation to educate ourselves as to the issues facing us as voters and citizens. Legitimate politics is the art of creating compromise and consensus to benefit the whole of society. It is not a sporting event, despite what our media or special interests might have us believe.

What is Scottish Rite? Although there is no higher degree than that of Master Mason, the 29 degrees of the Scottish Rite serve to enrich the philosophy of the Symbolic Lodge. A Mason who chooses to further his Masonic experience by becoming a 32° Scottish Rite Mason will be expanding upon the fundamental principles of Freemasonry. The moral and ethical lessons will allow him to be constantly reminded of his duty to God, Family, Country, and Fellow Man.
