At Grand Homecoming II last spring one of the initiatives that surfaced was the need to provide programs that will develop Valley officers. There were several specific suggestions offered.

- Establish a Body Officer selection process.
- Body Masters undertake greater leadership role in their Body.
- Body Masters maintain continuing communication with other officers.
- Increased utilization of Wardens.
- Utilization of Experts, Assistant Experts, and Deacons.
- Annual distribution of Officer’s job descriptions.
- Establish Director of Ritual for each Body.
- Open and close each Body in “full form”.
- Officer recognition.

These suggestions are only a few of the actions that would further enhance our Valley.

In keeping with the suggestion to establish a Body Officer selection process, the Executive Committee, at its last meeting, decided this could be accomplished by forming a Nominating Committee. The Committee will be made up of the Wardens and Chancellors of each Body. Each Committee member is encour-

aged to identify Brethren they believe to be the future leaders of Everett Valley. If we are to be great we must have leaders who are eager and capable of directing the affairs of each Body.

Last month we celebrated the Hebrew equivalent of Thanksgiving, “The Feast of Tishri”. This month we set aside the day of Thanksgiving in our country. Thanksgiving is a time for us to thank God for all the blessings and comforts that He has bestowed upon us. It is a time for us to be thankful for the liberties we enjoy in this great country, and it is a time to for us to be thankful for the strength we receive from our beloved Fraternity. May you, your family, and your friends enjoy a very “*Happy Thanksgiving!*”

Update your e-mail addresses

There you will find the latest information pertaining to the Valley as well as the ability to update your personal information in the Supreme data base. On the left side of the page is a column headed by a News Flash button. Below are several headings One is "Update your info". If you click on "Update your info" that will open a window where you can log into the Sentinel Database and update your personal information. Actually, the only bit of information that I need is

your current e-mail address. But while you are there you might as well look over the other information that is on file and make sure that it is current and up to date.

**GREATEST GENERATION
VALLEY PROFILES:
LEONARD MARTIN**

Born in Missoula, Montana, as a small child Bro. Leonard Martin came with his family to their farm in the Everett/Snohomish area in 1929. Two weeks out of Snohomish High School in 1943, he got his draft notice, and went to Europe with the Army a month after D-Day. As part of the 415th Infantry Regiment (“Old Faithful”) of the 104th (“Timberwolves”) Division, he saw action in the Mark River crossing (5 mi. from Breda, Holland) 10/31/44, where his best friend was killed in the foxhole they shared. Within a few days there were only 20 of them left in Co. B out of the original 210 and, surrounded by German “tiger” tanks, they were taken prisoner.

For almost 6 months he was a P.O.W., mainly in Stalag Iia, Magdeburg, & later in Stalag XIIb, south Germany, working mainly as gandy-dancer on the railroad tracks between Rostock, Germany, and Stettin, Poland. They were given German wood blankets that looked like wool, but had no warmth. To



begin with, each prisoner was given ¼ loaf of “bread” (made of oats, grain & sawdust) daily, but by the time they were liberated they were down to 11 men per loaf! There was occasionally a thin soup served. Leonard went down from 192 lb. to 136 lb. during this time. The Red Cross did provide cigarettes, and he also began sewing and cutting hair for cigarettes, which could be bartered for bread (3 American cigarettes for a 2 lb. loaf at first, but within 6 weeks it took 50 to get the loaf). The Germans did provide postcards and forms for letters.

Americans had it tough, but others had it worse. One time while obtaining the designated “soup” ra-

tion for the day, Leonard witnessed a great commotion while passing by the compound where the Russian P.O.W.’s were held. In his words, “We learned later that (because of) receiving little rations, they began fighting among themselves. To quiet the (ruckus), the German guards turned a dog loose on the Russian captives. Very shortly thereafter the (dog’s) hide and bones were thrown over the fence.”

The winter 1944-45 was the worst in 40 years, and Leonard got frosted lung damage during work from breathing the frigid air, which led to bleeding and was sent to a field hospital, then sent back “nicht arbeiten” which was fortunate as he could otherwise have done slave labor for some time. They were liberated 4/13/45 by Patton’s tank corps (this was a lucky Friday the 13th for him)! After some time in a field hospital in LeHavre, he returned to the USA. Among his Army awards are the Combat Infantry Badge, the Europe-African-Middle East Campaign ribbon with 3 stars, Prisoner ribbon, the Purple Heart, and the Bronze Star! He is past commander of Evergreen Chapter of AXPOW. Just a few months ago he also received the French

Croix de Guerre for being part of the effort to free France.

After returning from the war, Leonard married Laina (daughter of Fabian Nordquist, 32°, a long-time member of Everett Valley). They had 2 daughters and 1 son, 7 grandchildren and 7 great-grandchildren! Unfortunately Laina passed away several years ago. They lived for a short time on the flats by the Trestle till flooded out in 1949-50, then to the present home near Fobes Hill (not far from where his parents' farm had been) in the Snohomish area. Leonard became a plumber in 1952, and worked in that trade for 33 years till he retired.

We can't go into too much detail about his Masonic history or this article would be too long, but Leonard is P.M. of Alpha Lodge #212, member of York Rite Bodies and of course Everett Scottish Rite, where he was honored as a 33° In-



spector General Honorary 4 or 5 years ago! He was Isadore of Bohemia in the 21° for many years, participated in other degrees and had many offices, including being Oration of all bodies for a number of years. His specialty in recent years has been making many of our props, including the large 32° ring for our "graduation" ceremonies. He also began, and continues (with others), our JROTC awards program with a number of local high schools!

No article about Leonard would be complete without mentioning his February visits as "George Washington" to local schools and Everett Valley, which began in 1976! Also he began being "Slipjoint" the clown, at Nile Shrine about 15 years ago, and helping with the Easter Egg hunt festivities (he retired from parades the last few years). About 1 ½ years ago he began teaching his Sunday-school class at 1st Presbyterian with costumes from foreign countries, and is now making an alpine horn out of birch. He also collects and buys yarn, which he takes to the Monroe prison for the inmates to use for projects. He hasn't slowed down much, and in fact his newly hatched projects never end!

A man and Mason of many interests and accomplishments, he survived great trials in his youth, and has led a productive and generous life thereafter! Thank you for your service to our Country, and we're honored to know you, Ill. Bro. Leonard Martin, 33°!
