FREEMASONRY AND CHRISTMAS

The observance of Christmas doesn't seem to bring satisfaction to some people. On one hand, many say it's too religious, and thus don't want Christmas trees in public buildings and nativity scenes within a shepherd's-crook length of government lawns. On the other hand, many say it's not religious enough; it's too commercial. They've been saying it for years—it's the central theme behind the charming animated cartoon *A Charlie Brown Christmas* which was made some 40 years ago.

Setting that aside, what does Christmas mean to the Freemason?

Certainly Freemasonry is not a religion, Christian or otherwise. It leaves the determination on spiritual matters to each individual Mason, so long as he believes in the Almighty **M**reator. But there are certain messages from the story of Christmas that are applicable to all Masons, not just those who celebrate a certain birth on December 25th.

Many Christians feel God gave his greatest gift to mankind, and that Gift's birth is marked on Christmas Day. And the spirit of giving is also outlined in our Masonic ceremonies. The new Entered Apprentice is reminded in the northeast corner of charity, and to practice it whenever possible. There's the monetary charity of that portion of our ceremony. And there's another kind. The one referred to in the Charge in the same degree which admonishes "to relieve his necessities, soothe his afflictions, and do to him as you would that he, under similar circumstances, should do until you." In other words, the Golden Rule, from the Sermon on the Mount.

Christmas is a time of faith for our Christian brethren. But all Masons are reminded in the different degrees of the principle of faith. In the explanation of the First Degree Tracing Board, we hear "How ready and will-

ing ought we to be to adore the Almighty Creator." Therefore, let this time of year serve as a reminder to all Masons to practice their faith, whatever it may be.

Faith and Charity are names of principal staves or rounds on the Ladder you see every meeting on that Tracing Board. But there is another round, and that is Hope in Salvation. While Salvation has a particular connotation to those who believe in the story of the virgin birth, the concept of some kind of reward for following Masonic principles during our lives winds its way through the various degrees, as those of you familiar with the working tools explanations of the Second and Third Degrees well know.

So let this season of the year remind all Masons, no matter what their religious beliefs, to follow those universal tenets of the Craft—faith, hope and charity. Doing so should bring satisfaction to you at Christmas-time.

Visiting with the Elderly



Many adults stop visiting their elderly parents, relatives or friends for various reasons. One of the biggest problems is that we, as children of an aging population, either don't know how to visit with the elderly are uncomfortable for whatever reason. Here are some hints for productive visits with elderly people, whether living alone, in a residential facility or nursing home. Some of these tips are reprinted from *ElderCare: Coping with Late Life Crisis*, by James Kenny, Ph.D. and Stephen Spicer, M.D.

Visit regularly, especially with your parents, and schedule your visits. An estimated 20 to 30 percent of nursing home residents never have any visitors, a heart-breaking statistic. Let your elderly parent know in advance that you will be there. He or she can write it on the calendar and enjoy looking forward to your visit.

Plan your conversations. Make a mental list of interesting subjects to discuss. Pick some things you both enjoy talking about. You may want to mention an upcoming event that the older person can anticipate.

Allow enough time. Avoid "hit-and-run" visits. Get there on time and tell the person you are visiting how long you can stay. Spend

at least a half hour and don't expect to settle all his or her problems during that time. Visits are meant to be leisurely and pleasant.

Sit close or pull up a chair alongside. Older people may have difficulty seeing and hearing, and precious words might get lost on their way across the room. Being close conveys caring and stimulates good communication.

Bring something along. Surprises are always welcome, and it helps to have a concrete object to focus the conversation. Possibilities include a homemade card from your child, a plant or flowers from your garden, a favorite food or baked dish, a basket of fresh fruit, a letter from a mutual friend, photographs of family or friends, (especially rediscovered old photos), yarn for knitting, a magazine or book. Small personal items such as toilet articles, clothing and stationery make nice gifts. (NOTE: if the person is advanced in their dementia, consult with their physician or caregivers about the safety of some toiletries and other items that could be inadvertently consumed in error) If you can, bring a pet -- especially a small one. A puppy or kitten makes a very popular visitor that everyone will likely want to hold.

Bring a child along. Children can reach oldsters where adults fail, and old people generally enjoy

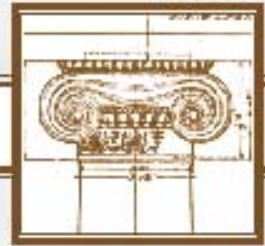
children in moderate doses. Some parents mistakenly feel that young children will be upset by exposure to a dreary nursing home. The truth is that youngsters often accept the most handicapped people easily and naturally.

Touch your elderly parent. Older people need physical contact. When talking with them, put your hand on their arm, hold hands or put your arm around them. Remember, touch is an eloquent form of communication, and the message is love.

Go for a walk. Get outside with the person you are visiting if at all possible. If they can't walk, push them in a wheelchair. Your visit may provide a rare chance for physical exercise. Older people need to move around regularly to keep their bodies functioning well.

Ask about the past. What was it like growing up? Most seniors enjoy reminiscing about times gone by. (Older lodge members really enjoy reminiscing about lodge functions, meetings and big events.)

Be yourself. This is the key to enjoying your visit. Don't put on an act. Plan to get as much out of your visits as you put into them. Tell your favorite stories, laugh, relax, and enjoy yourself -- and the person you are visiting. You might just learn something!!



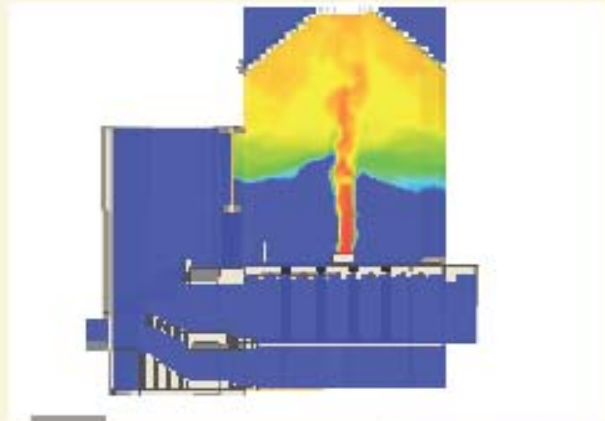
HOUSE OF THE TEMPLE

• Renovation Update for August 2010 •

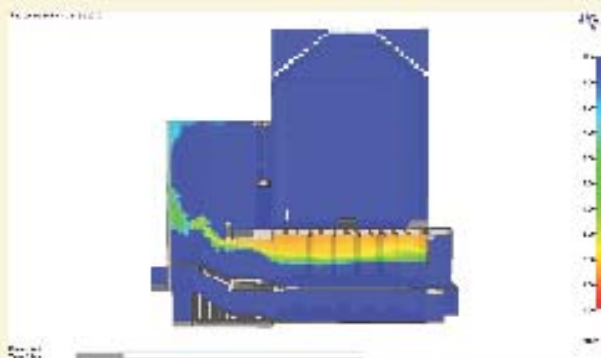
DURING AUGUST 2010, the Renovation Team focused on investigating how smoke generated by a fire would travel through the House of the Temple. To accomplish this task, a three dimensional computer model of the building was created to use for the investigation. The goal of the smoke modeling is to better understand the impact a fire in the building would have on the evacuation of the occupants. The model was used for two complementary analyses: Fire Dynamics Simulator [FDS] and EXODUS. The FDS software predicts smoke building up and movement in the building. The EXODUS program predicts exiting patterns. The model will continue to be used in the design process to test alternative approaches to mitigating smoke migration and exiting strategies.



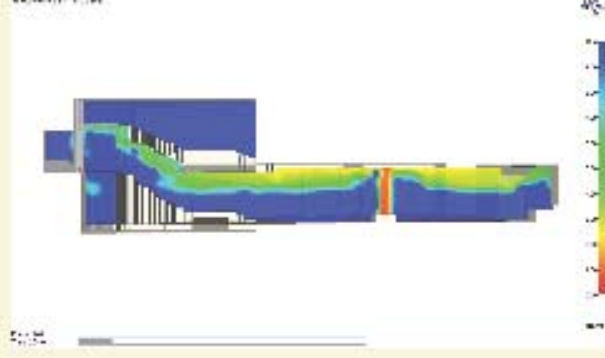
For purposes of this study, the focus was on the primary assembly spaces adjoining the monumental stair: the Temple Room, Atrium and Banquet Hall. The model depicted above is of the assembly spaces.



Based upon the fire in the center of the Temple Room, the smoke buildup down to six-feet above the floor with visibility of 30-feet was 400 seconds (6.66 minutes). All occupants of the Temple Room were able to evacuate the room in the event of fire.

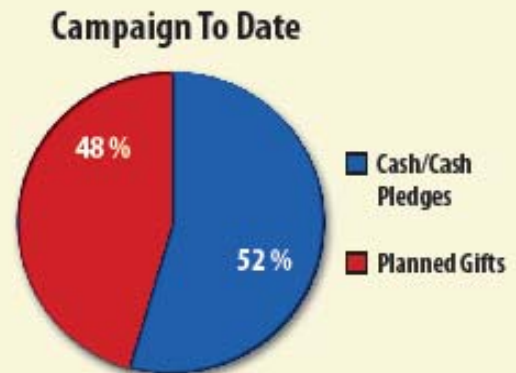
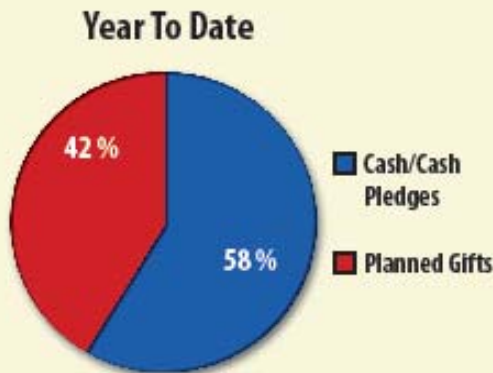
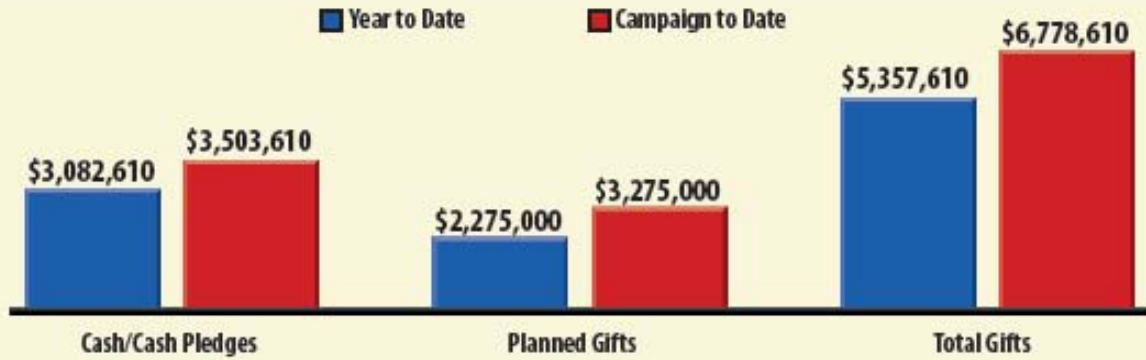


Based upon the fire at the location of the Intern Desk in the southwest corner of the Atrium, the smoke buildup down to six-feet above the floor with visibility of 30-feet was 360 seconds. All occupants of the Entrance Level were able to evacuate the building in the event of fire. If there is a fire in the Atrium, the occupants of the Temple Room must use the proposed NW stair to leave the Temple Room.



Based upon the fire in the center of the Banquet Hall, the smoke buildup down to six-feet above the floor with visibility of 30-feet was 240 seconds. Improvements must be made to minimize the smoke migration from a fire in the Banquet Hall to the adjacent corridors.
